Governing Authority






Assessments

Graham Expeditionary Middle School

GEMS uses the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Assessments at the beginning of the school year, in January, and at the end of the school year in an effort to correctly place, evaluate and support student work. A second function of the MAP data is to capture an additional objective data set to evaluate academic growth; a function of the state mandated value added measure. In addition a variety of assessments are given in the classroom throughout the year to measure Learning Targets met. At the end of each trimester students make presentations demonstrating their learning. GEMS administers the Ohio Achievement Assessments. GEMS also started an internal assessment calendar for teachers to administer interims halfway through and at the end of each trimester to help inform their teaching and assess student learning. At the end of each interim assessment week, staff meet in data teams to evaluate student progress and set goals for the next six weeks.









Celebrating our Work

Students exhibited work from their expeditions during our Celebrations of Learning each Trimester. Some of the festivities included an inventor's workshop, a popcorn factory from the early 1900's with unions and a strike through the hallway, an alternative energy debate, a poetry reading, and public service announcements about what to do in the event of a natural disaster.




OAA Results
